

During the Warranty Period, the Company will, at its discretion, repair or replace any defective covered Product. The Owner will be responsible for removing and reinstalling any and all repaired or replacement parts. This Limited Warranty only applies to the Company's Product if installed, used, and maintained in the manner recommended by Company, and this Limited Warranty is conditioned upon compliance with all such instructions. Lifetime telephone support for the Product is provided, as needed.
- 2) In the event the Product is damaged during shipping, it is the responsibility of the Buyer to refuse delivery, causing the Product to be returned to the manufacturer for repair. Title to the Product passes to the Buyer upon the Company's delivery to the freight carrier. The Company assumes no liability for damage caused by careless handling or poor installation, except for work completed by employees of the Company. Loss or damage to the Product when in possession of the freight carrier is the responsibility of the Customer and is not covered by this Limited Warranty.
- 3) Any information or suggestion by the Company with respect to the Product concerning applications, specifications or compliance with zoning, codes and standards is provided solely for your convenience and without any representation as to accuracy or suitability. You must verify and test the suitability of any information with respect to the Product for your specific application.
- 4) Sign Structure and Sign Face: In the event the sign structure or identification/changeable copy portion of the sign malfunctions under normal use and service thereof DURING THE LIFE OF THE SIGN due to material defects in workmanship or materials, the Company will, at its option, repair or replace any defective materials.
- 5) Vandalism to Sign Faces: This Limited Warranty covers polycarbonate faces against breakage due to vandalism DURING THE LIFE OF THE SIGN. Warranty protection does not extend to these surfaces if damaged by gunshots, or when damaged coincident with damage to the sign cabinet in which the faces are installed.
- 6) Failed electronic parts or assemblies, with the exception of lamps, will be repaired or replaced, at the sole discretion of the Company. Owner bears the expense and responsibility of shipping Product to Company's Repair Center. Replacement or repaired parts are warranted to be free from material defects in material or workmanship for ninety (90) days, or for the remainder of the Warranty Period of the Product they are replacing or in which they are installed, whichever is longer.
- 7) The Company will repair failed LED pixels if greater than one half of one percent (0.5%) of the total number of pixels in the sign have failed in one (1) catendar year, provided the sign is installed with the recommended ventilation system for its location. The definition of pixel failure is when all LED's in the pixel will no longer emit light. Pixel repair is performed at the Company Repair Center. It is common knowledge within the sign industry that all LEDs degrade and produce less light as they age. Eventually the LEDs will require replacement even though the LEDs will still emit light. This Limited Warranty does not cover normal LED degradation.
- 8) <u>Customer Obligations:</u>
  - Failure by the Customer to properly maintain the Product, including but not limited to filters and the ventilation/air conditioning systems, will void coverage for affected components. The Customer shall notify the Company immediately of equipment failure and allow the Company full and free access to the Product when required. Waiver of liability or other restriction shall not be imposed as a site access requirement. The Customer is responsible for all costs and management oversight associated with providing the Company access to the Product, providing the necessary machines, communication facilities and other equipment, inclusive of but not limited to lifting equipment. Should on-site repair be required, Customer is required to have a responsible individual on-site to provide access to the Product as well as sign off on a completed work order.
- 9) Exclusions and Restrictions:
  - The Company reserves the right to restrict service, limit replacement parts or invalidate this Limited Warranty to Customers whose account balance is past due. Any on-site service required by the Customer of Company technicians or a local authorized service provider is billable to the Customer based on an agreed upon written quote.

This Limited Warranty does not apply to software. Software is covered by a separate agreement, which appears in the Company's software license agreement.

Ballasts are covered for a period of three (3) years.

ID cabinet LED illumination and power supply are covered for a period of two (2) years, when purchased as a system.

- 10) This Limited Warranty specifically does not cover the following:
  - a) Third-party communication devices such as wireless devices and moderns, which are covered by a separate electronic communication warranty.
  - Damage to Product that has been moved from its original installation location or is mounted in a mobile structure.
  - c) Cosmetic damage to the Product (including but not limited to scratches and dents that do not otherwise affect the fit, form or functionality of the Product or materially impair its use).
  - d) Temperature sensor results: temperature sensors will register variable results, given local environmental factors such as direct sunlight, distance from concrete or asphalt, etc., results are not guaranteed or covered under this Limited Warranty.
  - e) Recovery or transfer of any data or software stored on the Product not originally installed on the Product by the Company.
  - f) Light bulbs or lamps.

## SUBSCRIBER AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, Public Safety Testing, Inc. is a skilled provider of pre-employment testing services to police, fire, and other public safety agencies, and

WHEREAS, the subscriber public agency, either directly or through a civil service commission, tests, evaluates, ranks and hires law enforcement and/or firefighters and/or other public safety positions in the performance of its public safety functions, and

WHEREAS, the subscribing public entity desires to join in a Subscriber Agreement, NOW, THEREFORE,

Public Safety Testing, Inc. (the "Contractor") and Pacific County Fire District No. 1, a municipal corporation of the state of Washington (hereinafter "Subscriber") do enter into this Subscriber Agreement under the terms and conditions set forth herein.

- Description of Basic Services. This Agreement begins on the date as noted on page one (1) of this Agreement. The Contractor will provide the following services to the Subscriber:
  - 1.1 Advertising and recruiting assistance, application intake processing, and administration of pre-employment written examinations and/or physical ability tests for those positions noted on Page One (1) of this Agreement.
    - 1.1.1 Written examinations are administered in-person at Contractor's test events, including those conducted by Subscribing agencies; remotely through a network of certified college testing facilities; and, through the Contractor's online, virtual in-home testing program.
    - 1.1.2 Physical ability tests for law enforcement and corrections applicants are administered at Contractor's test events, including those conducted by Subscribing agencies, and, through a network of partner gym and fitness facilities.
  - 1.2 Report to the Subscriber the scores of applicants, with all information necessary for the Subscriber to place passing applicants upon its eligibility list and rank them relative to other candidates on appropriately constituted continuous testing eligibility lists. Contractor will report "raw" test scores to the Subscriber no preference points will be factored into applicant scores and it is the Subscriber's responsibility to factor veteran's preference points in accordance with applicable federal and state laws. Written examination scores will be reported to the Subscriber as a percentage score (based on 100%) and physical ability test scores will be reported as "Pass" or "Fail". The passing score for written examinations is set by the test developer at 70%. For dispatcher candidates, the typing test results will be reported as words per minute (wpm) and accuracy rate (%).
  - 1.3 Appear in any administrative or civil service proceeding in order to testify to and provide any and all necessary information to document the validity of the testing process, to participate in the defense of any testing process conducted by the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement and to otherwise provide any information necessary to the Subscriber to evaluate challenges to or appeals from the testing process. The Contractor shall appear without additional charge. The Subscriber shall pay the reasonable cost of travel and appearance for any expert witness deemed necessary by the Subscriber to validate the testing process, including but not limited to, representatives of any company which holds the copyright to any testing material and whose testimony or appearance is deemed necessary to validate the process.

Provided, however, Contractor shall not be required to appear at its cost nor to defend in any administrative or court proceeding arising from or out of a claim or challenge relating to Subscriber's use of other testing process(es) or out of Subscriber's attempt to establish multiple or blended eligibility lists for the same position based in whole or in part on other testing process(es). "Other testing process(es)" means any test or testing process other than those provided by the Contractor under this Agreement.

- 1.4 <u>Term & Fees.</u> The term of this agreement and the related professional fees are noted on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 1.5 Payment. Subscriber shall pay an amount equal to twenty-five percent (25%) of the annual fee set forth above quarterly for services rendered in the previous quarter and for basic services including but not limited to, software relating to online application, advertising formats, previously advertised scheduling of test dates, model civil service rules, testing systems, as well as ongoing testing and recruitment, and any and all other work developed at the cost of the Contractor prior to or contemporaneous with the execution of this Agreement. Payment due within 30 days of receipt of invoice.
  - 1.5.1 <u>Direct Deposit (ACH Enrollment)</u>. Subscribers are encouraged to set up direct deposit (ACH enrollment) for their payments. There will be no additional fee for payments made using direct deposit (ACH enrollment).
  - 1.5.2 <u>Credit Card</u>. A three percent (3%) fee will be added at the time of payment to each payment made using a credit card. The purpose of such fee is to cover Contractor's credit card processing fees.
- Additional Services. In addition to the services provided under this Agreement, the Subscriber may, at its sole discretion, elect to purchase additional services from the Contractor. Such services shall be requested by and contracted for pursuant to separate written agreement.
- 3. Acknowledgements of Subscriber. The Subscriber understands and acknowledges, and specifically consents to the following stipulations and provisions:

  - 3.2 The written and physical agility scores of any applicant shall be valid for 18 months from the date of certification by the Contractor or 12 months from the date of placement upon the Subscriber's eligibility list, whichever first occurs, following the report of the Contractor, and rules compatible with continuous testing shall be adopted. The Subscriber shall review its applicable hiring processes, advertisements, personnel policies and civil service rules (as applicable) to ensure compliance with the provisions of this Agreement.

- 3.3 An applicant may, in addition to the Subscriber's eligibility list, elect to have his/her score reported to and subject to placement on the eligibility list of any other Subscriber. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted to prohibit the use of an applicants' score for consideration in or processing through any other subscriber's hiring and/or civil service eligibility process. The Subscriber agrees that if an applicant is hired by another agency through this service, the applicant's name shall be removed from Subscriber's eligibility list.
- 3.4 The Subscriber specifically understands and acknowledges that the Contractor may charge a reasonable testing fee from any and all applicants.
- 3.5 The Subscriber is encouraged to and may also conduct advertising as it deems necessary to support/enhance recruiting efforts. The Subscriber shall link PublicSafetyTesting.com on its agency's website, if it so maintains one.
- 3.6 Public Safety Testing views recruiting as a partnership with the Subscriber.

  The Subscriber agrees to actively participate in recruiting efforts for positions within the Subscriber agency.
- 3.7 The Subscriber agrees to keep the Contractor up-to-date as to the agency's hiring status, minimum and special requirements, all information appearing on the agency's PST website profile and the names of any candidates hired through these services.
- 3.8 If the Subscriber elects for the Contractor to conduct physical ability testing for firefighter candidates, the Subscriber agrees to complete a Candidate Physical Ability Test (CPAT) validity transportability study and successfully apply to the International Association of Firefighters (IAFF) for a CPAT License. The one-time fee for the validity transportability study is \$750. If the Subscriber is currently CPAT licensed, the Subscriber agrees to maintain a valid CPAT license throughout the term of this agreement.

#### 3.8.1 CPAT Administration Requirements (select one)

Subscriber does not require the CPAT to be sent scores. Contractor will make written scores available to the Subscriber regardless of whether a candidate had participated in a CPAT or not.
Subscriber requires candidates to successfully complete the CPAT administered only by the Contractor.
Subscriber will accept CPAT results from any licensed CPAT provider under the following conditions:

- a) The Subscriber understands that CPAT licensing rules require the Subscriber to have a CPAT Services Agreement with each CPAT provider from which the Subscriber will accept CPAT test results.
- b) Contractor will report CPAT results for those candidates that take the Contractor's CPAT test and will not report results from other CPAT

- providers. The Subscriber is required to confirm the CPAT results from non-Contractor CPAT providers.
- c) Subscriber understands and agrees that the Contractor cannot and will not defend or indemnify CPAT testing processes that were not conducted by the Contractor.
- 3.9 Subscriber understands and acknowledges that a candidate's PST Personal History Statement (PHS) will be stored electronically by PST for 24 months from the date the candidate uploads the PHS to the PST website. Any PHS stored more than 24 months will automatically be deleted and will no longer be available to the Subscriber from the PST server.
- 4. Testing Standard and Warranty of Fitness for Use. All testing services conducted under this Agreement shall be undertaken in accordance with the provisions of the Washington State Civil Service Statutes, Chapter 41.08 and/or 41.12 and/or 41.14 RCW, or the terms of other applicable statute as the Subscriber shall notify the Contractor that the Subscriber must meet. Tests shall also be conducted in accordance with the general standards established by the Subscriber; the Subscriber shall be responsible for notifying the Contractor of any unusual or special process or limitation. The test utilized, the proctoring of the test and any and all other services attendant to or necessary to provide a valid passing or failing score to the Subscriber shall be conducted in accordance with generally accepted practice in the human resources, Civil Service and Public Safety Testing community. The Subscriber may monitor the actions and operations of the Contractor at any time. The Contractor shall maintain complete written records of its procedures and the Subscriber may, on reasonable request, review such records during regular business hours. The Contractor expressly agrees and warrants that all tests and written materials utilized have been acquired by the Contractor in accordance with the appropriate copyright agreements and laws and that it has a valid right to use and administer any written materials and tests in accordance with such agreements and laws. If Subscriber uses or authorizes the use of other testing process(es) this warranty shall be null and void.
- 5. Independent Contractor. The Contractor is an independent contractor. Any and all agents, employees or contractors of the Contractor, shall have such relation only with the Contractor. Nothing herein shall be interpreted to create an employment, agency or contractual relationship between the Subscriber and any employee, agent or sub-contractor of the Contractor.



## FIRE TRAINING FACILITY SITE GRADING AND STORMWATER DESIGN

## RELATIONSHIP

For the purposes of this Agreement, the Client shall be Pacific County Fire District No. 1, Ocean Park, Washington, and the Engineer shall be Gibbs & Olson, Inc., Longview, Washington.

## PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Client intends to develop 4.5-acres of an existing 13.1-acre site (Pacific County Parcel No. 74039001000) to construct a firefighting training facility. The proposed development will consist of approximately 4.5 acres (314'  $\times$  550') of clearing, grubbing, and grading, and construction of 2.0-acres (300'  $\times$  300') of asphalt and concrete surfacing. The remaining 2.5 acres of cleared upland will be graded to facilitate mowing for gorse control. Temporary, portable structures comprised of shipping containers will be located on site in the paved area and used for firefighter training.

## **ASSUMPTIONS**

The following assumptions were utilized by Engineer in development of the scope of work. If any ultimate facts or events differ from these assumptions, Engineer's scope of work, schedule and compensation shall be adjusted accordingly.

- A. A topographic survey will be performed for the site and will be utilized for developing engineered drawings.
- B. Drawings will be developed in AutoCAD Civil 3D 2021.
- C. Existing environmental data previously prepared by Ecological Land Services, Inc. will be provided to the Engineer in AutoCAD format for use in preparing engineered drawings.
- No cultural or historical resource evaluation or investigation is required for this project.
- E. Engineer assumes the project site is "clean" regarding hazardous or contaminated materials and that there is no subsurface soil or groundwater contamination present within the project site.
- F. A SEPA Checklist will be prepared by the Engineer.
- G. A full site stormwater analysis will be prepared by the Engineer meeting the requirements of Pacific County.
- H. Section 7.0 Floodway Analysis of the Drainage Report as outlined in Section 3.5.2 of Pacific County's Land Alterations Standards and Surface Water Control Standards will not be required by the County.
- Coverage under Washington Department of Ecology's Construction Stormwater General Permit is required.
- J. Engineer will prepare the upfront portions of a construction Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP). The construction contractor will prepare the portions of the SWPPP specific to the contractor's selected means, methods, and sequencing of construction.

- K. A geotechnical investigation will not be performed for this site.
- L. The site is in an area of high groundwater; therefore, infiltration will not be utilized to address flow control of runoff.
- M. Engineer will attend meetings virtually via video conference or phone.
- N. Engineer will address one round of County review comments and make appropriate revisions to the drawings and stormwater report. Addressing any subsequent County review comments is not included in the Engineer's budget estimate and will be out of scope work and billed on a time and material basis at Engineer's standard rates.
- O. Permit applications, the SWPPP, 60% complete and final plans, draft and final stormwater report deliverables will be in electronic PDF format. One 22"x34" hardcopy of the final drawings and one hardcopy stormwater report will also be provided to the Client.
- P. Evaluation or extension of other utilities (water, sewer, power, communication, etc.) to the site is not included in this Scope of Work.

## SCOPE OF WORK

The Engineer's Scope of Work for this project is presented below:

## Task 1 - Project Management, Administration & Meetings

Engineer will perform day to day management and administrative activities including oversight of Engineer's work, staff scheduling, budgeting, invoicing, and preparing monthly progress reports to Client. Project management will also include coordination and communication with Client.

Engineer will also conduct an onsite visit with Client to discuss project and better understand existing site conditions. As part of this onsite visit, the Engineer will field mark the limits for utility locates to be performed within.

Engineer has budgeted for up to five virtual meetings or conference calls with the Client and for up to two virtual meetings or conference calls with Pacific County and the Client.

## Task 2 - Topographic Survey

Engineer will perform the following under this task:

- Office calculations to prepare information required to perform a field topographic and boundary survey of the project site, (see Attachment 1: Area of Topographic Survey), which includes 200 feet of Highway 103 road frontage, the 0.95-acre access roadway area, the 4.31-acre training center area, and a portion of the 1.61-acre wetland "A" area west of the existing ditch. Property corner and monument information will be researched, and information obtain will be used to depict the property boundary for the topographic survey. A boundary survey will not be recorded with Pacific County.
- Request utility locates by others within the locate limits field marked by Engineer in Task 1.
- Field topographic survey of the project, including establishing horizontal and vertical control as appropriate. The survey will utilize the Washington Plane Coordinate System (WPCS), with NAVD88 vertical datum, NAD83/2011 (Epoch 2010.00), Geoid G2012BU1,

derived from Washington State Reference Network (WSRN). Horizontal datum will be NAD 83 and vertical datum will be NAVD 88. The survey will be performed in U.S. Survey Feet. Engineer anticipates utilizing a combination of both traditional and GPS survey methods to perform the topographical survey in a time efficient manner.

Engineer will utilize the topographic survey to create an AutoCAD base map of existing
conditions for the site design drawings. Engineer will also set up to three temporary
benchmarks suitable for use during construction within the project limits.

## Task 3 - Site Grading and Stormwater Design Drawings and Construction Contract Documents

Engineer will prepare site grading and stormwater design for the proposed improvements. It is anticipated paving will be limited to the existing on-site training area. Existing driveway connections adjacent to Highway 103 will remain and no additional driveway connections or improvements will be required.

The Engineer will prepare final design drawings with technical specification notes included on the drawings. The Engineer will also prepare construction contract documents consisting of bid documents, construction contract, and general conditions based on the current edition of Washington State Department of Transportation standard specifications. ## Task 4 - Stormwater Evaluation and Drainage Report

The Engineer will perform stormwater evaluation and drainage report for review and approval by Pacific County based on the Client's proposed site plan. The Engineer will perform or prepare the following as part of the stormwater report.

- Prepare site plans to show the limit of proposed clearing, site grading and asphalt and concrete surfaces.
- Perform stormwater modeling and evaluation to determine the volume of runoff for sizing stormwater facilities.
- Prepare a drainage report to address stormwater Minimum Requirements 1-11 of the 1992 Puget Sound Manual per Pacific County requirements.
- Prepare drawings for inclusion with the drainage report, including existing conditions, temporary sediment and erosion control, and site drainage Schematic figures.
- A stamped/signed drainage report describing the proposed improvements and how stormwater will be addressed.
- Completion of the upfront portions of a construction Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP). The construction contractor will be required to complete the portions of the SWPPP that are specific to the contractors means, methods and sequencing of the construction work.

## Task 5 - Permits

The following permits are anticipated to be required for construction of the proposed project:

- Pacific County Fill & Grade permit
- SEPA Checklist
- Coverage under Ecology's Construction General Stormwater Permit.

The Engineer will prepare these permit applications and appropriate exhibits and attachments for submission to Pacific County and Ecology. The Engineer will prepare the upfront portion of the SWPPP.

The SEPA Checklist determination is required prior to being able to submit the application to Ecology for coverage under Ecology's Construction General Stormwater Permit.

## **BID AND CONSTRUCTION PHASE SERVICES**

Services by the Engineer for these phases of the project are not included in this Scope of Work. Services for these phases can be incorporated into this Agreement via amendment near the end of final design and permitting if desired by the Client.

## **SCHEDULE**

The Client desires to be able to construct the project starting in late spring or early summer of 2022 and to have construction complete by September 30, 2022.




EXHIBIT A - ATTACHMENT 1 - AREA OF TOPOGRAPHIC SURVEY

## EXHIBIT C GENERAL CONDITIONS

### A. HEADINGS

Headings in this Agreement are for convenience only and are not intended to be used in interpreting or construing the terms, covenants, and conditions of this Agreement.

### B. STANDARD OF PRACTICE

Services performed by the Engineer under this Agreement will be conducted in a manner consistent with that level of care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of the profession currently practicing in the same locality and under similar conditions at the time the services are performed. No other representation expressed or implied, and no warranty or guarantee is included or intended in this Agreement, or in any report, opinion, document or otherwise.

## C. MAINTENANCE OF PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS AND ETHICS

The Client recognizes that the Engineer's services in all cases must be rendered in accordance with prevailing professional standards and ethics, as well as certain laws or regulations that apply specifically to the Engineer. If a situation emerges that causes the Engineer to believe compliance with the Client's wishes could result in the Engineer violating an applicable provision or aspect of professional standards or ethics, laws or regulations, the Engineer shall so advise the Client, and the Client and the Engineer shall immediately begin discussions to arrive at a mutually satisfactory solution. Failing achievement of a solution, either party may terminate this Agreement in accordance with termination provisions stated herein.

## D. NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARIES

Engineer's services are intended for the Client's sole use and benefit and solely for the Client's use on this Project and shall not create any third-party rights. Except as agreed in writing, Engineer's services and work products shall not be used by or relied upon by any other person or entity.

### E. ASSIGNMENT

The Engineer shall not assign this Agreement in whole or in part nor subcontract any portion of the work to be performed hereunder, except that the Engineer may use the services of persons and entities not in his or her employ when it is appropriate and customary to do so. Such persons and entities include, but are not necessarily limited to, specialized consultants, and testing laboratories. The Engineer's use of others for additional services shall not be unreasonably restricted by the Client provided the Engineer notifies the Client in advance.

## F. INDEPENDENT CONSULTANT

The Engineer is an independent consultant. The Engineer and Engineer's employees or agents performing work under this Agreement are not employees or agents of the Client. The Engineer will not hold itself out as nor claim to be an officer or employee of the Client. The Engineer will not make any claim of right, privilege, or benefit which would accrue to an employee of Client under law. The Client shall neither be liable for nor obligated to pay sick leave, vacation pay, or any other benefit of employment, nor to pay any social security or other payroll taxes as due. Industrial or any other insurance which is purchased for the benefit of the Engineer shall not be deemed to convert this Agreement to an employment contract.

It is recognized that the Engineer may or will be performing professional services during the term for other parties and that the Client is not the exclusive user of the Engineer's services; provided, however, that the performance of other professional services shall not conflict with or interfere with the Engineer's ability to perform the services to be performed under this Agreement.

## G. INSURANCE

The Engineer maintains: 1) worker's compensation and employer's liability insurance of a form and in an amount as required by state law; 2) comprehensive general liability and automotive liability insurance; and 3) professional liability insurance to cover negligent errors or omissions for which the Engineer becomes legally obligated to pay. Certificates of Insurance (COI) shall be provided to the Client upon request. The Client will be named as an additional insured if required on the comprehensive general liability and automotive liability insurance policies.

Client agrees to require Engineer and any Subconsultants, subcontractors or third parties utilized by Engineer to be named as additional insureds for all insurance policies related to this Project carried by contractors, subcontractors and suppliers on which Client has been or will be named as an additional insured.

### H. INDEMNIFICATION

The Engineer agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to indemnify and hold harmless the Client, its officers, directors, and employees (collectively, Client) against all damages, liabilities, or costs, including reasonable attorneys' fees and defense costs, to the extent caused by the Engineer's negligent performance of professional services under this Agreement and that of its subconsultants or anyone for whom the Engineer is legally liable.

The Client agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to indemnify and hold harmless the Engineer, its officers, directors, employees and subconsultants (collectively, Engineer) against all damages, liabilities, or costs, including reasonable attorneys' fees and defense costs, to the extent caused by the Client's negligent acts in connection with the Project and the acts of its contractors, subcontractors or consultants or anyone for whom the Client is legally liable.

Neither the Client nor the Engineer shall be obligated to indemnify or defend the other party in any manner whatsoever for the other party's own negligence.

The provisions of this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

### I. BILLING AND PAYMENT

BUDGET FOR SERVICES: The budget estimate included in this proposal is only for those services identified within
the attached scope of work. The budget and proposed scope of work are based on information currently available to
the Engineer. If conditions change, unforeseen circumstances are encountered, or work efforts are redirected, the
budget estimate may require modification. Similarly, if the work efforts are completed quicker than the time
estimated or direct expenses are less than estimated, the Engineer will bill the Client only for the time or expense
encountered.

Monthly billings will be submitted on a time and materials basis but will not exceed the estimated budget for the identified Scope of Work without the Client's prior authorization. For projects that extend beyond the calendar year in which the Agreement is executed was executed, the Engineer's billing rates are subject to adjustment each January.

- REIMBURSABLE EXPENSES: Expenses incurred in connection with project tasks such as out-of-town subsistence, long distance telephone, reproduction costs and similar, will be invoiced at direct cost plus Ten (10%) percent. Mileage will be invoiced at the current IRS rate per mile.
- SERVICES BY OTHERS: If this project requires the specialized services of consultants and other technical companies, then such services will be utilized only with the Client's written approval, with the cost of such services included at the invoice cost plus Ten (10%) percent.
- 4. INVOICES. The Engineer will submit monthly invoices to Client and a final bill upon completion of services. Payment is due upon receipt of the invoice and is past due Thirty (30) days after the invoice date. Client agrees that the invoice balance is correct unless Engineer is notified in writing within Fourteen (14) days of the invoice date. In the event of a disputed or contested billing, only that portion so contested will be withheld from payment, and the undisputed portion will be paid. The Client will exercise reasonableness in contesting any bill or portion thereof. No interest will accrue on any contested portion of the billing until it is mutually resolved.

A service charge of 12% per annum (1% per month) will be added on all unpaid balances over Sixty (60) days old. If the account becomes delinquent, Engineer will perform no further services on the project until the Client pays the outstanding balance plus applicable interest or, at the Engineer's sole discretion, until satisfactory written payment arrangements have been made between the Engineer and the Client.

## J. CHANGES IN THE AGREEMENT

If during performance of this Agreement, the Client requests additional services to be performed, or if conditions or circumstances are discovered which were not contemplated by the Engineer at the commencement of this Agreement, then the Engineer shall notify the Client in writing of the additional services to be performed or the newly discovered conditions or circumstances. The Client and Engineer shall renegotiate in good faith, the budget, schedule, and other applicable conditions of this Agreement. Unless otherwise agreed to, the Client and Engineer shall have Thirty (30) days after the notice to reach agreement on the amended terms and conditions.

### K. RIGHT OF ENTRY

The Client shall provide for right of entry to the project site. Such right of entry shall be for the Engineer and others, and necessary equipment for the Engineer to fulfill the scope of services indicated in this Agreement. While the Engineer will take all reasonable precautions to minimize damage to the property, the Client understands that in the normal course of work some damage may occur, the correction of which is not part of this Agreement.

### L. OPINION OF CONSTRUCTION COST

The Engineer shall submit to the Client an opinion of the probable cost required to construct work recommended, designed, or specified by the Engineer. The Engineer is not a construction cost estimator or construction contractor, nor should the Engineer's rendering an opinion of probable construction costs be considered equivalent to the nature and extent of service a construction cost estimator or construction contractor would provide. The Engineer's opinion will be based solely upon his or her own experience with construction. This requires the Engineer to make assumptions as to actual conditions that will be encountered on site; the specific decisions of other design professionals engaged; the means and methods of construction the contractor will employ; the cost and extent of labor, equipment, and materials the contractor will employ; contractor's techniques in determining prices and market conditions at the time, and other factors over which the Engineer has no control. Given the assumptions which must be made, the Engineer cannot guarantee the accuracy of his or her opinion of cost, and, in recognition of that fact, the Client waives any claim against the Engineer relative to the accuracy of the Engineer's opinion of probable construction cost.

## M. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

All reports, field data, field notes, test data, calculations, Drawings, specifications, cost opinions, quantity estimates, electronic files, and other documents (Document) prepared by the Engineer are instruments of service and the Engineer retains an ownership and property interest (including the copyright, if applicable, and the right of reuse) in such Documents whether, or not, the Project is completed. Upon payment in full to Engineer, Engineer grants Client a license to use the Documents on the project and extensions of the project, subject to the following limitations: 1) Client may make and retain copies of Documents for information, reference and submittal to regulatory agencies; 2) Client acknowledges that such Documents are not intended or represented to be suitable for use on the Project unless completed by Engineer; 3) any reuse or modification of the Documents by any party other than Engineer is at Client's sole risk and without any liability whatsoever to Engineer; and 4) Client shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless Engineer from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including attorneys' fees, arising out of or resulting from any use of Documents other than completion of the specific Project for which they were prepared.

## N. DISPUTES

In the event of a dispute arising under this Agreement and if the dispute cannot be settled through direct discussions, the parties agree to first attempt to settle the dispute by non-binding mediation before recourse to a judicial forum. If the dispute is settled by litigation, the substantially prevailing party shall be awarded its reasonable costs incurred, including staff time at current billing rates, court costs, expert witness fees, attorney's fees upon trial, or appeal, collection or lien fees, late payment charges and interest, and other claim related expenses. Venue for any litigation shall be the Superior Court of the County in which the project is located.

### O. TERMINATION

The Client may terminate this Agreement by giving the Engineer Thirty (30) days written notice. The Client or the Engineer may terminate this Agreement for reasons identified elsewhere in the Agreement or for other reasons which may arise.

Either party may terminate this Agreement if either party fails substantially to perform through no fault of the other and does not commence correction of such nonperformance within Five (5) workdays of written notice and diligently complete the correction thereafter. If corrective action is not taken within Five (5) workdays, termination will become effective Fourteen (14) calendar days after receipt of the termination notice.

Irrespective of which party shall affect termination or the cause therefore, or if the Client suspends work on the project for more than three (3) months, the Client shall within Thirty (30) calendar days of termination or suspension remunerate the Engineer for services rendered and costs incurred, in accordance with the Engineer's prevailing fee schedule and expense reimbursement policy. Services shall include those rendered up to the time of termination or suspension, as well as those associated with termination or suspension itself, such as demobilizing, modifying schedules, reassigning personnel, and so on. Costs shall include those incurred up to the time of termination or suspension, as well as those associated with termination or suspension and post-termination or suspension activities.

## P. GOVERNING LAW

Unless otherwise provided in an addendum, the laws of the state in which the project takes place will govern the validity of this Agreement, its interpretation and performance, and remedies for contract breach or any other claims related to the Agreement. Venue for any litigation shall be the Superior Court in which the project is located.

## Q. SEVERABILITY

Client and Engineer have entered into this Agreement of their own free will, to communicate to each other mutual understandings and responsibilities. Any element of this Agreement later held to violate a law or regulation shall be deemed void, and all remaining provisions shall continue in force. However, the Client and the Engineer will in good faith attempt to replace an invalid or unenforceable provision with one that is valid and enforceable, and which comes as close as possible to expressing or achieving the intent of the original provision.

### R. INTEGRATION

This Agreement, including attachments incorporated herein by reference, comprises a final and complete repository of understandings between the Client and the Engineer. It supersedes all prior or contemporaneous communications, representations, or agreements, whether oral or written, relating to the subject matter of this Agreement. Each party has advised the other to read this document thoroughly before accepting it to help assure it accurately conveys meanings and intents. Acceptance of this Agreement as provided for signifies that each party has read the document thoroughly and has had any questions or concerns completely explained by independent counsel and is satisfied. The Client and the Engineer agree that modifications to this Agreement shall not be binding unless made in writing and signed by an authorized representative of each party.

### S. AGREEMENT DOCUMENTS

The following documents comprise the complete Agreement between the Client and Engineer.

Letter Agreement signed by Client and Engineer

Exhibit A - Scope of Work

Exhibit B - Budget Estimate

Exhibit C - General Conditions

Individuals executing this Agreement on behalf of the Client and the Engineer represents and warrants that such individuals are duly authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement on behalf of the Client or the Engineer.

The exchange of copies of this Agreement and of signature pages by facsimile transmission (whether directly from one facsimile device to another by means of a dial-up connection or whether mediated by the worldwide web), by electronic mail in "portable document format" (".pdf") form, or by any other electronic means intended to preserve the original graphic and pictorial appearance of a document, or by a combination of such means, shall constitute effective execution and delivery of this Agreement as to the parties and may be used in lieu of an original Agreement for all purposes.

Signatures of the parties transmitted by facsimile or by electronic mail in .pdf form shall be deemed to be their original signatures for all purposes.

## T. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

The Engineer shall not be liable for loss or damage occasioned by delays beyond Engineer's control, or for loss of earnings, loss of use or other incidental or consequential damages suffered by Client or others, however caused. Engineer's liability hereunder, whether in tort or in contract, for any cause of action, inclusive of legal costs, shall be limited to 100 percent of the fee earned by Engineer under this Agreement.

#### Addressing your questions:

- 1) Yes, we have 2 Demo's...both Ford F-350 4x4 diesel Red
  - **3227-1** is the first Demo. This is the Demo unit what your proposal as based upon. It's off the assembly line and in the field in Oregon with my sales rep counterpart. This is on a 2020 Ford F-350 chassis.
  - 3226-1 is coming off the line next week. I will check to see if it's sold yet. I was told by
    our Demo associate that one Demo sold this week, but our Demo report doesn't come
    out until tomorrow (Friday morning and see which one sold it might not be either of
    these two. I will check tomorrow morning with both of my associates and see what the
    situation is. This Demo is on a 2019 F-350 chassis. Note: The Ford warranty begins
    when the Demo is delivered to the customer.
  - None of our Demo units are built with Liquid Spring suspension. F-350's do not require a Liquid Spring suspension kneeling feature as they will allow the cot/gurney to be rolled in with the Stryker PowerLoad system and other cot/gurney configurations. A Liquid Suspension package can be added after the Demo is built, but it's significantly higher. Probably around \$14,000. If we catch a Demo at the right time...before it's finished in assembly... and not mounted on a chassis... we can add a Liquid Spring suspension for around \$10,500.
